# How Grafton Medical Partners uses your information to provide you with healthcare

During the current coronavirus epidemic, the UK Government has required all GP practices to provide access to patients' Summary Care Record for all NHS organisations and full (Read Only) access to the GP clinical records for NHS 111 and the COVID Clinical Assessment Service. This is to enable emergency patient care during the epidemic and will expire on 30th September 2020 unless new regulations require it to be ended sooner or later.

Previous opt-outs from the Summary Care Record still apply.

This practice keeps medical records confidential and complies with the General Data Protection Regulation.

We hold your medical record so that we can provide you with safe care and treatment.

We will also use your information so that this practice can check and review the quality of the care we provide. This helps us to improve our services to you.

We will share relevant information from your medical record with other health or social care staff or organisations when they provide you with care. For example, your GP will share information when they refer you to a specialist in a hospital. Or your GP will send details about your prescription to your chosen pharmacy. Other organisations involved in your care may include:

- GPs
- NHS Commissioning Support Units
- Social Care Services

- Independent Contractors such as dentists, opticians, pharmacists
- Private Sector Providers
- Voluntary Sector Providers

Healthcare staff working in A&E and out of hours care will also have access to your information. For example, it is important that staff who are treating you in an emergency know if you have any allergic reactions. This will involve the use of your Summary Care

## **Registering for NHS care**

- This database holds your name, address, date of birth and NHS Number but it does not hold information about the care you receive.
- The database is held by NHS Digital, a national organisation which has legal responsibilities to collect NHS data.

# **Our Clinical System**

- A data processor acting on our behalf, EMIS Health, hosts data at a third-party data centre, which is owned and operated by Amazon Web Services. This is subject to the terms of the GP Systems of Choice Framework (GPSOC) which is managed by NHS Digital on behalf of the Secretary of State for Health.
- The data (which includes special category health data which is collected via our clinical IT system and which forms the patient's medical record is stored in a thirdparty data centre (which acts on the instructions of EMIS Health, who in turn will act in accordance with instructions received from, or on behalf of, ourselves as the relevant controller pursuant to our call off contract under the GPSOC Framework or as otherwise documented).
- There is no material change to the manner in which the data is being processed (in terms of data sharing and/or use) as a consequence of the change from hostage at the processor's own data centre to a third-party data centre.

## **Identifying patients who might be at risk of certain diseases**

- Your medical records will be searched by a computer programme so that we can identify patients who might be at high risk from certain diseases such as heart disease or unplanned admissions to hospital.
- This means we can offer patients additional care or support as early as possible.
- This process will involve linking information from your GP record with information from other health or social care services you have used.
- Information which identifies you will only be seen by this practice.

# How your information is shared so that this practice can meet legal requirements

The law requires Grafton Medical Partners to share information from your medical records in certain circumstances. Information is shared so that the NHS or Public Health England can, for example:

- plan and manage services;
- check that the care being provided is safe;
- prevent infectious diseases from spreading.

We will share information with NHS Digital, the Care Quality Commission and local health protection team (or Public Health England) when the law requires us to do so. Please see below for more information.

We must also share your information if a court of law orders us to do so.

# **NHS Digital**

- NHS Digital is a national body which has legal responsibilities to collect information about health and social care services.
- It collects information from across the NHS in England and provides reports on how the NHS is performing. These reports help to plan and improve services to patients.
- This practice must comply with the law and will send data to NHS Digital, for example, when it is told to do so by the Secretary of State for Health or NHS England under the Health and Social Care Act 2012.

#### Medical research

#### This is important because:

- the use of information from GP medical records is very useful in developing new treatments and medicines;
- medical researchers use information from medical records to help answer important questions about illnesses and disease so that improvements can be made to the care and treatment patients receive.

We will only share identifiable information with medical research organisations with your explicit consent or when the law allows.

We share anonymised data from GP medical records with the following research organisations: The Clinical Research Datalink, QRESEARCH.

# Checking the quality of care - national clinical audits

Grafton Medical Partners contributes to national clinical audits so that healthcare can be checked and reviewed.

- Information from medical records can help doctors and other healthcare workers measure and check the quality of care which is provided to you.
- The results of the checks or audits can show where hospitals are doing well and where they need to improve.

- The results of the checks or audits are used to recommend improvements to patient care.
- Data are sent to NHS Digital, a national body with legal responsibilities to collect data.
- The data will include information about you, such as your NHS Number and date of birth and information about your health which is recorded in coded form - for example the code for diabetes or high blood pressure.
- We will only share your information for national clinical audits or checking purposes when the law allows.
